Introduction: When you were selected as OA Troop Representative, you agreed to provide leadership and service in our Troop This responsibility should be fun and rewarding This job description provides some of the things you are expected to do while serving as a junior leader.

Responsible to: Assistant Senior Patrol Leader (Troop)

Specific Duties:

- Finds out who the District OA Chief is, and serves as a communication link between the lodge or chapter and the Troop
- Encourages year-round and resident camping in the Troop
- Encourages older Scout participation in high adventure programs
- Encourages Scouts to actively participate in community service projects
- Assists with leadership skills training in the Troop
- Encourages Arrowmen to assume leadership positions in the Troop
- Encourages Arrowmen in the Troop to be active participants in lodge and/or chapter activities and to seal their Order membership by becoming Brotherhood members
- Sets the example
- Enthusiastically wears the Scout uniform correctly
- Lives by the Scout Oath, the Scout Law, and the OA Obligation
- Shows Scout Spirit
